## From the Desk of Rev. Mulberry

I'm a romantic or an idealist. I get easily disappointed. Getting disappointed is not always a good thing in church ministry. I can get incredibly excited with what is possible and then, when what is possible does not come to fruition, I can feel like the bottom has dropped out.

So I had this grand dream of 100% congregational involvement in the new polity. In the wider mainline denominational church, we have lost the expectation that "all hands need to be on deck" for the church process to operate faithfully. I romantically believe that many gifts, all gifts, are needed. When more and more gifts are

included, we are a healthier congregation.

I say that in worship because I believe it. We lose gifts without you. The idea that we lose gifts to the earth with the destruction of the diversity of the rain forest also applies, I believe, to congregations. We need folks who will make phone calls, who will provide leadership, plant flowers, say prayers, write down prayer concerns, order coffee, organize meals. The list goes on and on.

I have dreams that the mainline congregational church, our mainline congregational church, will recover its Congregational polity by living and believing in ways where all gifts are needed. I know we

will not get 100% participation, but I want us to build a culture where 100% is expected, wanted, and desired.

So I was disappointed to see how few names we have listed in the current polity after so much hard work by the Nominating Committee. We need you. We need your gifts. If you are not sure where you might fit in the current polity structure, please ask and keep asking. I realize I'm a romantic and an idealist. Maybe I'm calling Community UCC to be where the Christian church has always been: somewhere between the reality and the ideal.

For many churches, talking about money is considered a taboo.

I would respectfully suggest that we are not "many" churches. This is a UCC church. We are a denomination in dialogue, and we are truly living our theology when we replace that period with a comma and keep talking.

For many churches, talking about money is considered a taboo, but at Community United we ...

The question is, what follows? How will we take up the conversation? All too often what follows is sagging shoulders, a furrowed brow and a two-year-old style whine of "But, I don't have the energy to deal with this!"

I would ask you to consider the possibility that resource deficits in the church are symptoms not of

scarcity but of the middle class ethos. We are frozen by angst over what lies before us and by guilt over what we've left undone. We feel overwhelmed by demands. At work, at leisure or at home, we can barely contend with all that is expected of us. And facing the nuts and bolts of our church's finances inspires us to, well, look for a way out.

As part of that exit strategy, when talking about money, we too easily lapse into the magical thinking of a gospel of happiness, which simplistically equates good intentions with economic success. Or we proclaim a message of passive dependence—"God will provide/The money is always there when we need it"—which fosters complacency and inaction. Neither the gospel of happiness nor the gospel of dependence offers practical solutions nor an opportunity to be

in dialogue with each other. By closing off conversation, we close off relationship and without relationship, church becomes just one more demand.

I encourage us all to live UCC theology and embrace a gospel of community in action—which, in the face of taboos, begins with talking.

In the next several months, I will be calling for volunteers to host small brunches or dinners at their homes so we can begin to talk, intimately, about stewardship in Community United Church of Christ. This is our church. Its economic well-being is in our hands, but that doesn't have to be one more burden. It offers us the blessing of relationship.

Let's talk about it.

Expenses are over budget for the month and year-to-date. Expenses were \$2,177 greater than revenues for the month and \$7,819.70 for the year. The net income of \$10,020.32 is really a variance between the projected budget position and our actual net income. Our true net income at this point is \$11,020, but that is skewed because of the advance pledge payments. The following information illuminates how that "skewing" takes place:

We had total pledges of \$205,000 of which \$26,080 were either paid in 2006 or paid in full as of April 30, 2007. That leaves \$178,920 or \$14,910 per month remaining for the year. So far in 2007 we have received \$54,935 of that balance or an average of \$13,734 per month through April. (\$1,176 per month below the necessary average.) In order to meet our pledge budget, we now need to receive an average of \$15,498 per month from May through December.

## Donation of Soup for TIMES Center

CUCC dates for making soup for TIMES shelter are June 14-19. This is a prior notice since we will be out of town May 6-29. Buckets are available in upstairs kitchen for the next few Sundays. TIMES is an overnight shelter for men, they feed women and children at noon and dinner, but they do not stay overnight. CUCC has supported TIMES since it was the Men's shelter at McKinley (actually from the very beginning as an all volunteer effort starting in early 1980's). The workers use the soup provided by volunteers to provide lunches to whoever shows up.

Any kind of soup is fine except for cream soups which do not freeze well. Vegetarian, meat, with pasta, rice, etc, and vegetables are fine. Chili is popular. These men spend a lot of the day walking so don't drain the fat, they are not counting calories--they need the fat. You may take the soup to the shelter or bring buckets to church and put them in upstairs freezer in kitchen. Ice Cream buckets should be available in upstairs kitchen any time. You may have to get them off the top of storage cabinet in the kitchen since I will not be there to set them out, but we will be sure there is a supply there.

Some of our church members have cooked meals at TIMES, some have served on the board, and have contributed motel soaps, shampoo, etc, and there may be other services that I am not aware of. We always have a good response to request for soup and hope this June will be no exception.

She enjoys playing with Rose, shopping, riding her bike with Rose in tow, gardening and the great outdoors. She also commonly goes by her last name, Chappell .

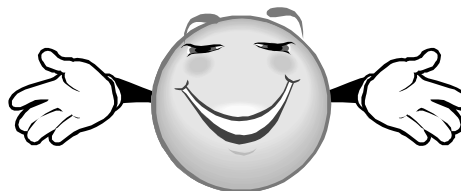
