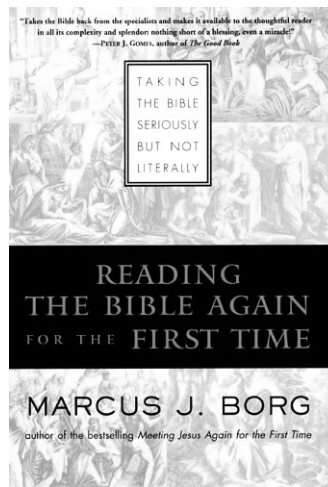

## Letters from Leah

“Christ the Lord is Risen today, Alleluia!” I’ve been singing that for month now. For the commercial world, Easter ended once all the eggs and bunny rabbits got shoved on the clearance rack. But that’s the beauty of being part of the sacred world: for us, Easter isn’t a day – it’s a lifestyle. As Christian people, we live in the reality of the resurrection where death has no hold and life is full of possibility beyond our wildest imaginations:

The world says, “death” and the resurrected Christ says, “life”.

The world says, “hate” and the resurrected Christ says, “love”.

The world says, “fear” and the resurrected Christ says, “understanding”.

The world says, “violence” and the resurrected Christ says, “peace”.

The world says a lot of things that keep us bound up and entombed. But the resurrected Christ rolls away the stone and invites us into new life. I am so proud to be part of a congregation that lives this new life in profound ways. I am immensely impressed with the ways you have chosen to be an Easter people. That’s why we’re exploring our Core Values during this sermon series. In addition to exploring what it means for us to be a Just Peace, GLBTQ Open and Affirming and Progressive Church, we have also set aside two Sundays in this sermon series to celebrate our relationship to the Campus Ministry and our Christian Education program. May 16 – We are a Progressive People


May 23 – We are a Vital Church People with Pentecost Potluck to follow fun & games for all – don’t miss it!

I am excited about this sermon series because it gives us a chance to explore these values we hold as a community of faith.

We’re going to follow that up with our summer sermon series exploring a fantastic book by Marcus Borg, **“Reading the Bible Again for the First Time: Taking the Bible Seriously not Literally.”** As Progressive Christians, at best we struggle with our relationship to scripture. At worst, we ignore it entirely. We’ve allowed the Bible to be co-opted by other Christians who want to use it as a weapon. Since we’re not interested in doing that, but don’t know how to respond when people start wielding it, we tend to shrink back for those situations. But, you know what – it’s my Bible too! Let’s not let our book be hijacked anymore.

I hope you will join me this summer in exploring this profound and challenging text. You can sign up to purchase a book early this month in the parlor after worship. The cost is \$13.01 and checks may be made payable to Jane Addams Book Store. Or, you can purchase your own. Either way, this is one sermon series resource you won’t want to miss out on.

## What Do I Say to Someone Who is Grieving?

In April, Pastor Leah attended a Carle Hospital seminar entitled “At a Loss: Exploring the Shared Experience of Grief & Bereavement & the Helping Professional’s Response.” What a helpful, informative event! One presentation, “What to Say/What to Do” addressed dilemmas we all face: what do I say when someone’s experienced a loss? We all have insecurities in these situations. We’re terrified of saying the wrong thing. We don’t want to offer pithy advice. So...what to do? What to do? Here are some situations and options:

### *What Do I Say?*

We want to start a compassionate conversation with a grieving person, but aren’t sure how, so we say, “How are you?” This may feel like an overwhelming question for the person to try to begin to answer, or it might imply that we simply want a summary from them.

#### **Instead, try...**

“I’ve been thinking of you and wondering how you’re managing.”

“I imagine this has been a complicated time for you, I hope today brings some peaceful moments.”

### *What Do I Say?*

We want the grieving person to trust us and know that we’ve gone through something similar, so we say, “I know how you feel, when my [loved one] died,…” This is problematic because it turns the attention and conversation back on ourselves and away from the grieving person’s experience.

#### **Instead, try...**

“When my [loved one] died, I know how I felt, but I’m wondering about what you’re thinking and feeling. Would you be comfortable sharing that with me while I just listen?”

### *What Do I Say?*

We are uncomfortable with someone’s grief process and say, “You need to be strong now” or “They wouldn’t want you to feel this way” or “You need to move on for the sake of…” This is directive and places our own expectations upon others, judging and hindering a person’s unique grief experience.

#### **Instead, try...**

“I imagine this has been difficult, has anything or anyone been particularly helpful to you?”

“I care about you and have been thinking about you. May I ask how you’ve been sleeping and eating or getting out and around lately?”

### *What Do I Say?*

We want to offer help but don’t know what they need, so we say, “Call me if you need anything.” This can be problematic for grieving people who may not be able to name their needs or are uncomfortable asking for help.

#### **Instead try...**

“I’m available on [day/time] and I would be glad to keep you company or run some errands for you. Would that be helpful?”

“If it’s alright with you, I would like to call on [day/time] to check in with you.”

### *What Do I Say?*

We want to convey a sense of hope or spiritual comfort, so we say, “It’s God’s will/plan” or “At least they’re in heaven now and aren’t suffering” or “At least you still have…” This minimizes grief and make faith-based assumptions that a person may not share with you at that moment.

#### **Instead, try...**

“Whatever you’re feeling right now, I still care very much for you and will support you.”

“I don’t understand why these things happen, but I will hold you in my heart prayerfully and remain available to support you.”

### *What Do I Do?*

#### *Specific Thoughts About Supporting Grieving Children...*

- Utilize appropriate disclosure about the events that are occurring, children are perceptive and become alarmed when excluded from events.
- Don’t speak in code language when explaining death. If you believe in an afterlife, speak as plainly and reassuringly as you can about it.
- Allow children to be present and participatory in the death event if they want that, allowing any and all questions and observations from them.
- Reassure children, unequivocally, that despite the events surrounding them, they will be loved and cared for by a trusted adult.

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## “Scenes from Seminary” by Eileen Gebbie

The 50 days of Easter are both defining and befuddling. Our confession of faith in a justice worker who walked out of a tomb is central to who we are but challenging within our hyper-rational world. My professors have pushed back on rationality, asking me to look at what the stories say and what the stories are trying to do.

That leads me to bodies, something church has most often asked us to leave at the door. But the Easter story is all about a body, and a pained, shamed body at that. A healer during his life, Jesus' appearance after his execution was in a body of bruises, holes, starvation, and thirst. His body bore the marks of Roman shame and social degradation.

We know how brokenness feels. Whether our bodies have been hurt by other people, or we carry the pain of discriminations of the body (racism, sexism, ableism, heterosexism, ageism, xenophobia, classism, fear of mental illness, poor access to medical care, food deserts, and the like), or we have come to hurt ourselves (food, addiction, or isolation), our bodies are busted up.

In returning wounded, Jesus is not making a claim about redemptive suffering. Remember, he was a healer. God heals. Instead, Jesus is bearing witness to social wounds, the shame inflicted by society that we carry, too. Jesus was not annihilated by humanity, but a reflection of humanity's cruelty. And he is guide for how we might refuse annihilation ourselves.

In life, Jesus healed. In death, Jesus bears witness. Divine love heals us so that we may witness for ourselves and each other, so that we may refuse shame for ourselves and each other.

May your God-given body be with you. Lift up your wounds. Receive healing from the love divine. Jesus was brutalized. Christ is risen. Divine love comes again and again.
