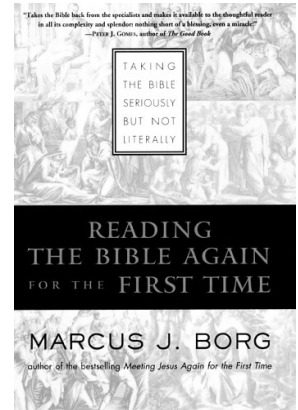

## Letters from Leah

There I was on Pentecost, preaching about the Holy Spirit. I had made it clear in my sermon: the best way for us to understand the Holy Spirit is to recognize how the Spirit works. If we merely try to define the Holy Spirit, we'll be missing the point. But if we can recognize the Spirit-infused moments in our own lives, we'll be on the right track. As I was preaching I noticed little Miranda Isaacs in the back of the sanctuary. In true toddler form, she was bopping back and forth between her mom and the table of toys.

As I preached, she continued. Little by little, she would venture further away from Sarah, until, eventually, she started down the aisle. This was the moment when I stopped preaching. I don't mean that I literally stopped. I was still speaking. I kept going. I kept saying what I had planned to say, ruminated on and prayed over all week long, as I watched Miranda toddle down the aisle. What I mean by saying, "that was the moment when I stopped preaching" is that, suddenly, Miranda was the one who was preaching.

She didn't make a bee-line down the center aisle, intent on getting up to the chancel, the Holy of Holies, the place where people mistakenly think God lives in sanctuaries. Instead, she took her time. Miranda crisscrossed the aisle. She meandered. She doddled. She took her time. One by one, she stopped at nearly every pew's end. Miranda moved like the Holy Spirit through the sanctuary. Like the Holy Spirit, Miranda checked in with us that morning. She moved through the sanctuary quietly. As with the movement of the Spirit, some people didn't know she was there, while other people surely saw the face of God when they looked her in the eye. The Spirit shows up when we least expect it. The Spirit moves among us sometimes like the rush of wind, as with the people at the first Pentecost, and sometimes, like a wandering toddler at our Pentecost celebration.

Of all the examples I *could have given* about how the Holy Spirit works, none could have been as good as that one. That's why, when Miranda did make it up to the chancel area, I did stop preaching, literally. All week, preparing for that sermon, I had been praying for the Holy Spirit to move among us that day. As I watched Miranda make her way up the aisle, I thought I had a choice. I could ignore her and just keep on going. Or, I could allow myself to recognize the arrival of the gift that I had hoped for that day. When I allowed myself to do so, it was blessedly overwhelming. When the Spirit moves, it often is.

Thanks, Miranda. Let's tag-team preach again sometime.

When new members join our church, we invite them to write their own statement of faith. When our young people are confirmed, we ask them to do likewise. So, now it's your turn. It doesn't have to be long, or over-detailed. It just needs to be true. ## Moderator's Musings

At some stress-filled moment, have you had the experience of realizing you had forgotten to use important life lessons learned?

*Life is a succession of lessons, which must be lived to be understood.* (Ralph Waldo Emerson)

I have found that the most important lessons are those that lead us out of pain and into happiness. That seems simple, right? Here are some life lessons I think that can apply to all of us. I hope they will help lead you into discovering life lessons of your own.

**1. Laughter and Tears Go Hand in Hand.** Many jokes start with, "There's good news and there is bad news." When something unexpectedly happens to us that we consider unfortunate, we often exclaim, "You've got to be kidding!" It's amazing how often laughter and tears commingle. Have you ever wondered why we have a party (reception) after a funeral? How could everyone be so happy on so sad an occasion? At times of loss, we need laughter as well as tears - the laughter is what enables us to move on.

**2. Be a Storyteller.** No, we don't have to be professional storytellers! For most of us, our personal stories *are* the most important ones we will ever know. And it may come as a surprise to you that you are full of stories, and that those stories are interesting. Your stories are about what happened yesterday, or about that day many years ago when you discovered you were in love, or the first time you flew on an airplane.

From beginning to end, our lives are stories. Not all stories are happy ones, but that's okay—our stories reflect our lives, and sometimes our lives are sad. Even if we're at a point in life where we find it difficult to tell happy stories, we need to keep the stories coming. When we neglect our stories, we are wasting the precious gifts that time can bring. It is when we are pondering our stories that we are using time to the utmost.

**3. Appreciate the Moment and Be grateful.** Take notice that good things that are happening right *now*, whether it's a beautiful sky, a happy child, an efficient grocery store clerk, or hitting all the green lights for a change. You do not know how many years or days you'll live, so live every moment fully. It's easy to lapse into worrying about the future, or dreaming of better things to come, or stewing in our regrets over the past while we miss the golden sunlight streaming in our window, or don't hear the lovely song playing on the radio.

Taking stock of all the good things in life and being grateful for them will keep each of us in the moment and could make us happier. Know that if you choose to believe there is a gift in everything that happens to you, you will always find one.

**4. School is never over. Be curious.** The 4th grade science teacher may no longer be breathing down our necks but we are still learning. Sometimes the lessons smack us upside the head with their impact. Others times it is a slow subtle journey to enlightenment. The best teachers are the ones who take us on a journey. I encourage you to try to be like a young child, seeing the world through new eyes, rather than making the world fit into your expectations. This will help you learn new things, lose assumptions, and gain new perspectives. Like school we can accept just what's in the books or discover what else there is to be revealed through life.

**5. Believe in Angels.** As a child we believe in things we cannot see, like angels. I had a Guardian Angel, who was sent by God to protect me. But as I grew up I downplayed them as make-believe characters from my childhood. Now as a parent I am watching my daughter experience life, and I revived my belief in angels. I think angels are an important part of life - they are messengers of God - "prayer ambassadors." I like that term, because I do think they play an important role as we pray to God and God answers us.

I think of angels not as those creatures with wings, but as thoughts or impulses that tell me that things are not as grim as I imagine them to be. Why is my favorite song playing on the radio just when I feel down? What makes the right person come into my life at the right moment and say just the right thing? I like to think that life is an ongoing communication with God. And so, I believe in angels.

Life is turbulent. Happiness is a result of what is happening inside of you, not what is happening on the outside. As we enter into summer and a slower pace...ponder your life lessons and remember these mantras to live by:

*"Remember to breathe. Really breathe"*

*"Ask for what you want; accept what you receive, and you will get what you need."*

*"Serenity is not freedom from the storm, but peace within the storm."*

## Soup for the TIMES Center

TIMES center has gotten a lot of attention from us recently, but we also make soup for lunches twice a year, as we have done for many years. June is the month that we generally make soup and take it to TIMES.

Any kind of soup is acceptable except cream soups which do not freeze well. I will have ice cream buckets at church on Sunday, May 23 and 30 and into June. Or you can use your own ice cream bucket. The men love chili (and have lots of chili powder so do not send extra), they also like any meaty, rich soup. They are working and do a lot of walking so they do not worry about fat. You can use any kind of meat (there are also some vegetarians), with beans, pasta, rice, or whatever you wish.

Please leave an inch of empty space in soup container, it tends to swell when frozen. Also PLEASE label your soup with the kind it is and the date. You may take the soup to TIMES (corner of Washington and Market, by RR tracks) yourself, or you may leave it at church in upstairs kitchen freezer (lower door of freezer) and I will see that it gets to TIMES.

## “Scenes from Seminary” by Eileen Gebbie

The path to ordained ministry has many steps. In January I applied to the CUCC Life Board, requesting that our leadership nominate me to the Eastern Association of the Illinois Conference for “student in care” status. After reading through my application, the Life Board interviewed me, and voted in favor of the nomination. The Life Board also formally recognized Deb Townsend, Becky Hanson, Tom Watembach, Richard Schnuer, Deirdre Lanesskog, and Rev. Karen Bush as my In Care Committee, the CUCC members charged with supporting and advising me along the way.

I then submitted the same materials to the Association (our regional governing body), while Rev. Karen, Tom Watembach, Ken Gilbert, and Rev. Leah Robberts-Mosser added letters of recommendation. Earlier this month, Rev. Leah joined me for an interview with the Association’s Committee on Ministry. I was accepted “into care” and assigned a mentor from the committee, Rev. Paula Comper of Sauk Village’s UCC.

In addition to my ongoing service to CUCC, I will meet regularly with Rev. Paula and annually with the Committee on Ministry. At the end of my Master of Divinity degree, I will again ask CUCC to nominate me, this time for ordination. Papers and an oral exam with the Association follow. Ordination itself does not happen until/unless I receive a call from a congregation.

I share all of this to celebrate the voice and role of individuals and congregations in the UCC’s development of leaders. As Rev. Lillian Daniel writes in *This Odd and Wondrous Calling*, local church is “the place where disciples are nurtured, grown, called, and sent out.” Even more importantly, lay and ordained leaders are equally honored.

As I finish this semester and prepare for my summer chaplaincy at Northwestern Memorial Hospital, I am filled with gratitude for the UCC as a whole, and Community in particular. I thank each of you for your encouragement, questions, and material support—including the beautiful flowers after the “in care” vote! Thank you for accepting God’s call to live in community, to see each other’s gifts, and to create spaces where we all might serve.

Last winter, I had twins who spent a long time in the NICU. The Care committee at UCC, headed by the parish nurse, Linda Morgan, brought my family and me many excellent meals to help us transition from having babies in the NICU to bringing our babies home. 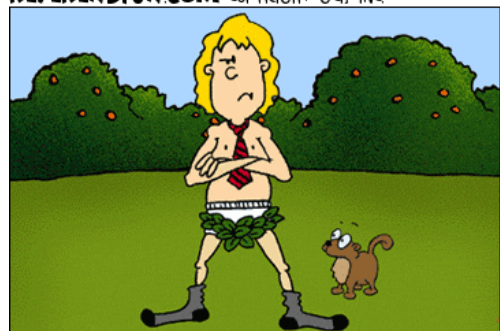
